That act outlaws "mutilation such as amputation of essential parts of the body such as the genitalia, ears or tongue and any other part of the body. Justice on pedophiles have become the only recommendation to erase pedophilia from the society although not every victim is lucky to be vindicated and not many victims are courageous to speak up hereby the Culprits go unpunished and, in some cases, accept it has their way of life.
